Methodology

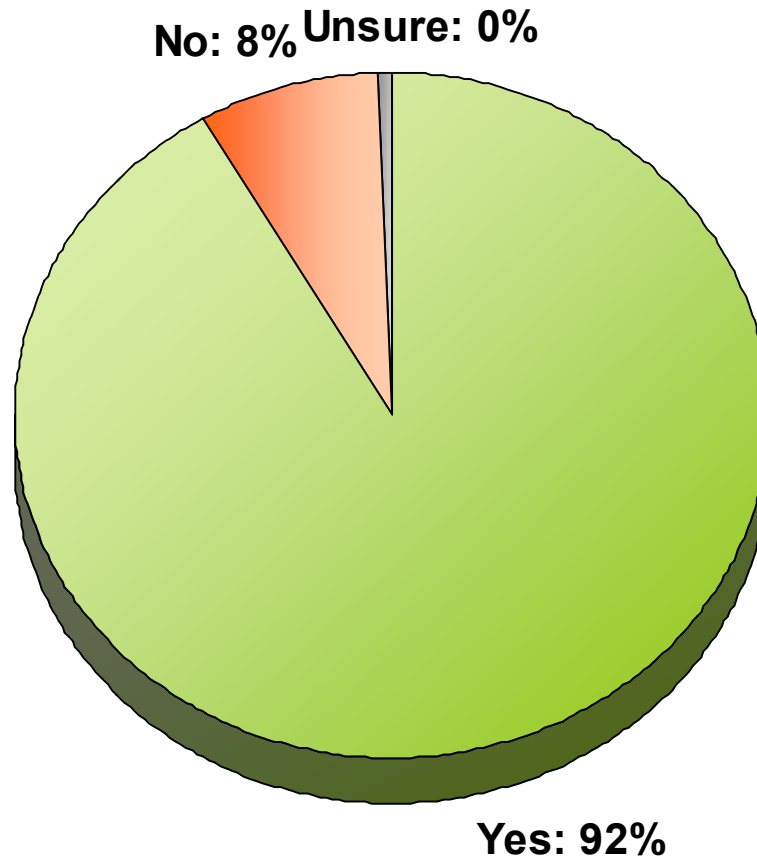
- n = 1000
- Nationally representative sample
- Age: 18+
- Fieldwork: 7-12 January 2010
- Maximum margin of error at 95% confidence level: ± 3.1
- Data is weighted and matched with ABS census data to ensure a nationally representative sample

Key Findings

- High level of awareness of attacks on Indian students
- Only 1 in 3 think that Indian students are attacked because of their race
- Men and Victorians more likely to disagree that attacks on Indians are racially motivated

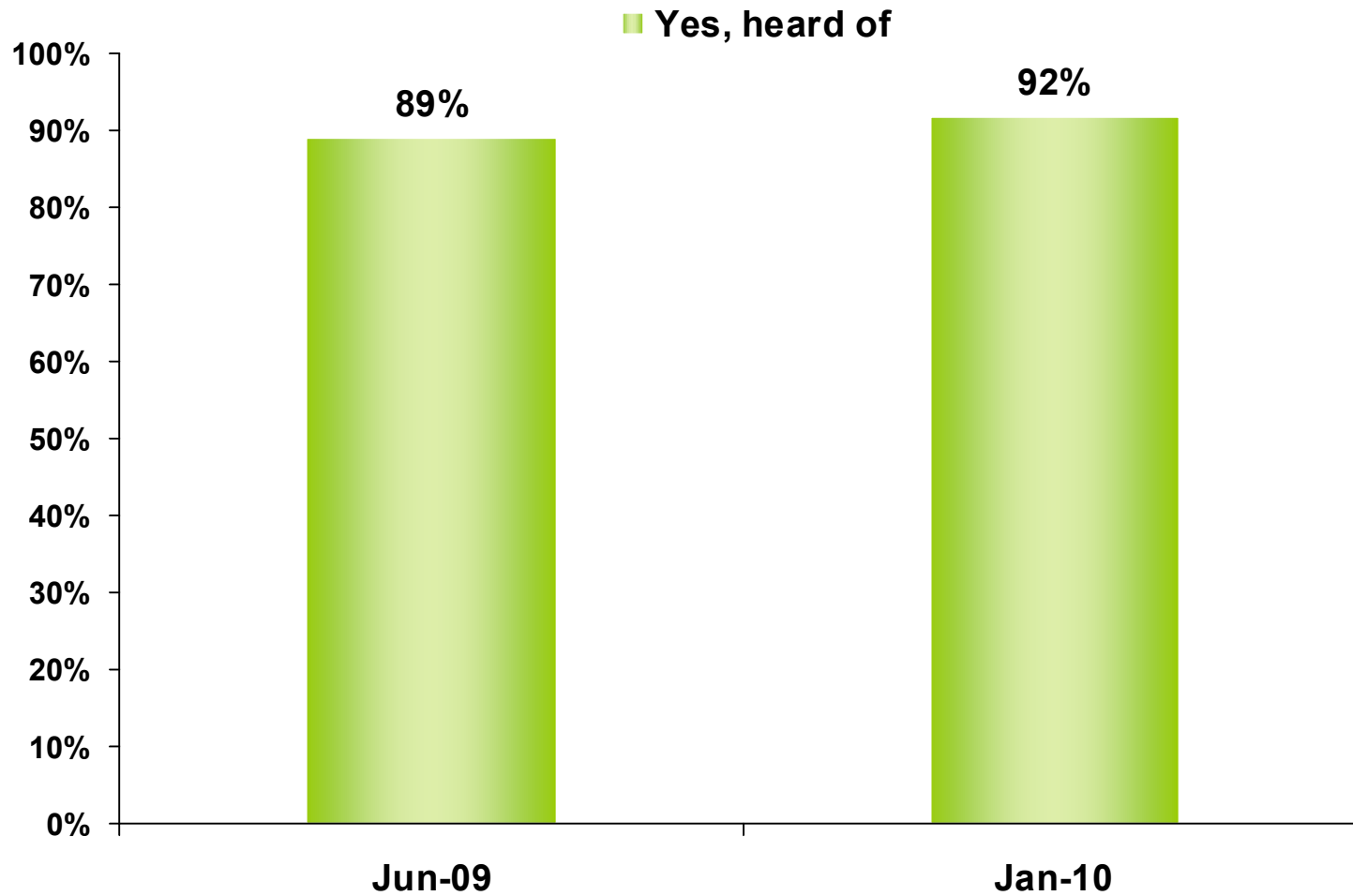
Very high awareness of attacks on Indian students

Have you heard of the recent attacks on Indian students in Australia?



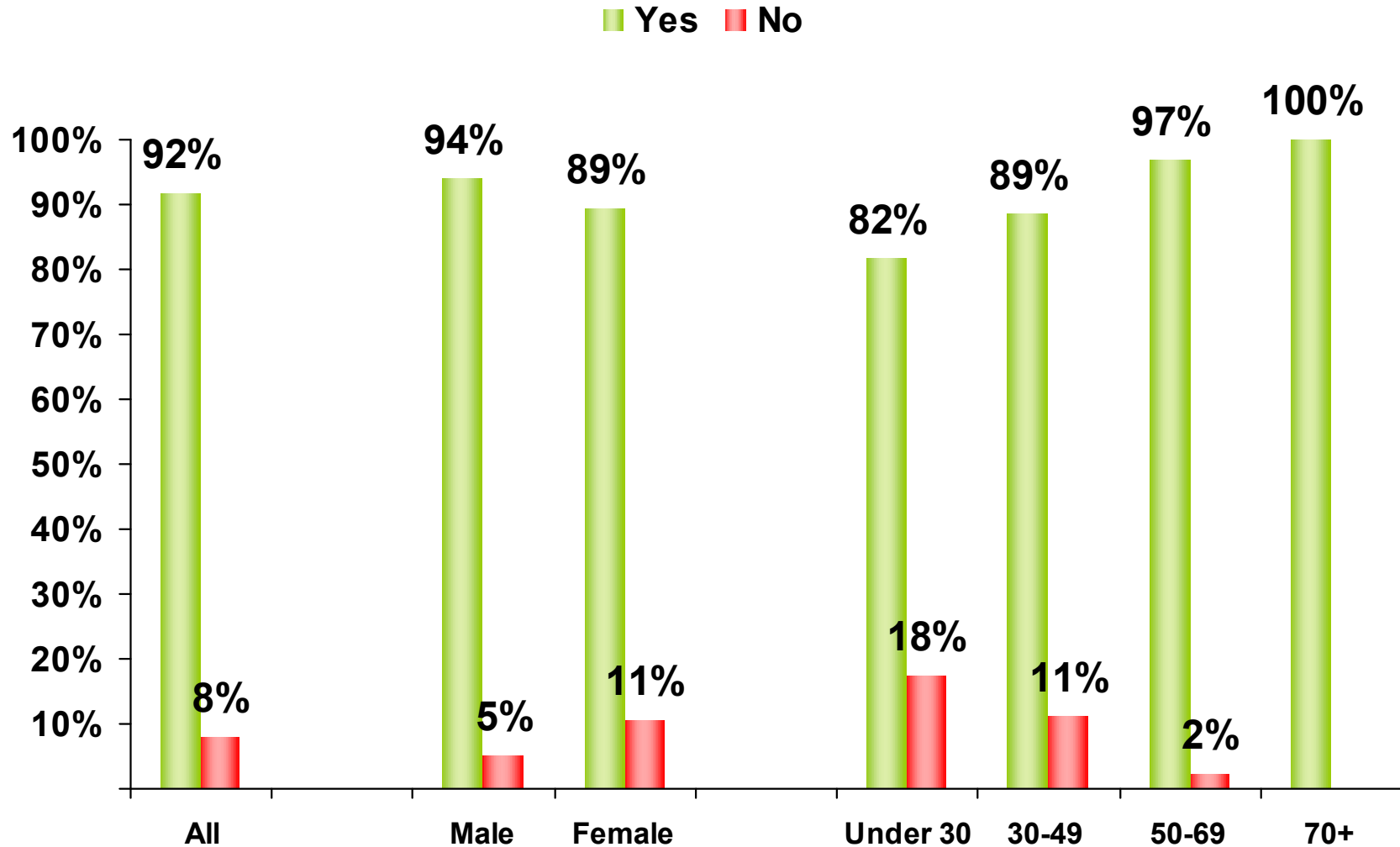
Awareness increased since June 09

Have you heard of the recent attacks on Indian students in Australia?



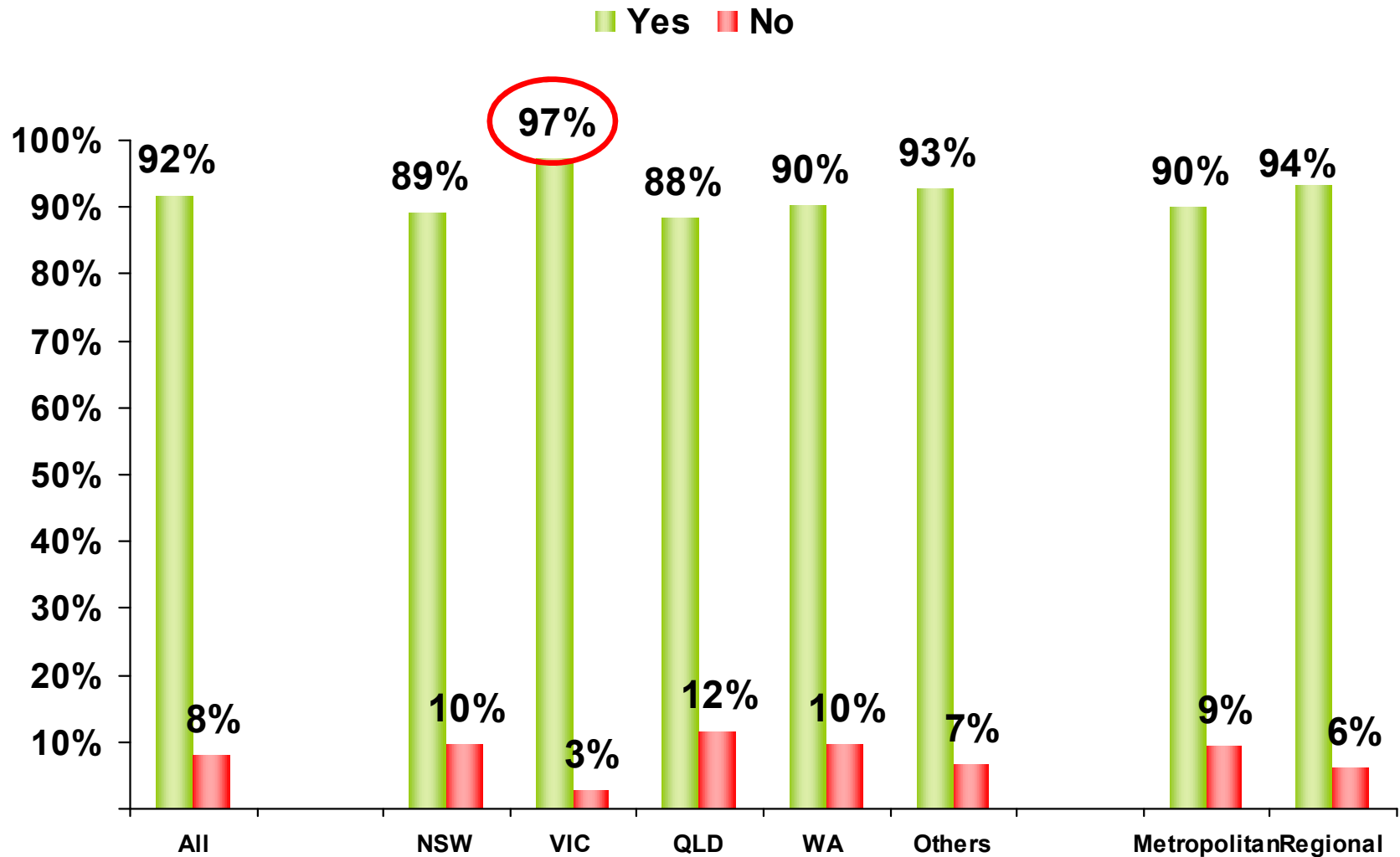
Men and older Australians more aware

Have you heard of the recent attacks on Indian students in Australia?



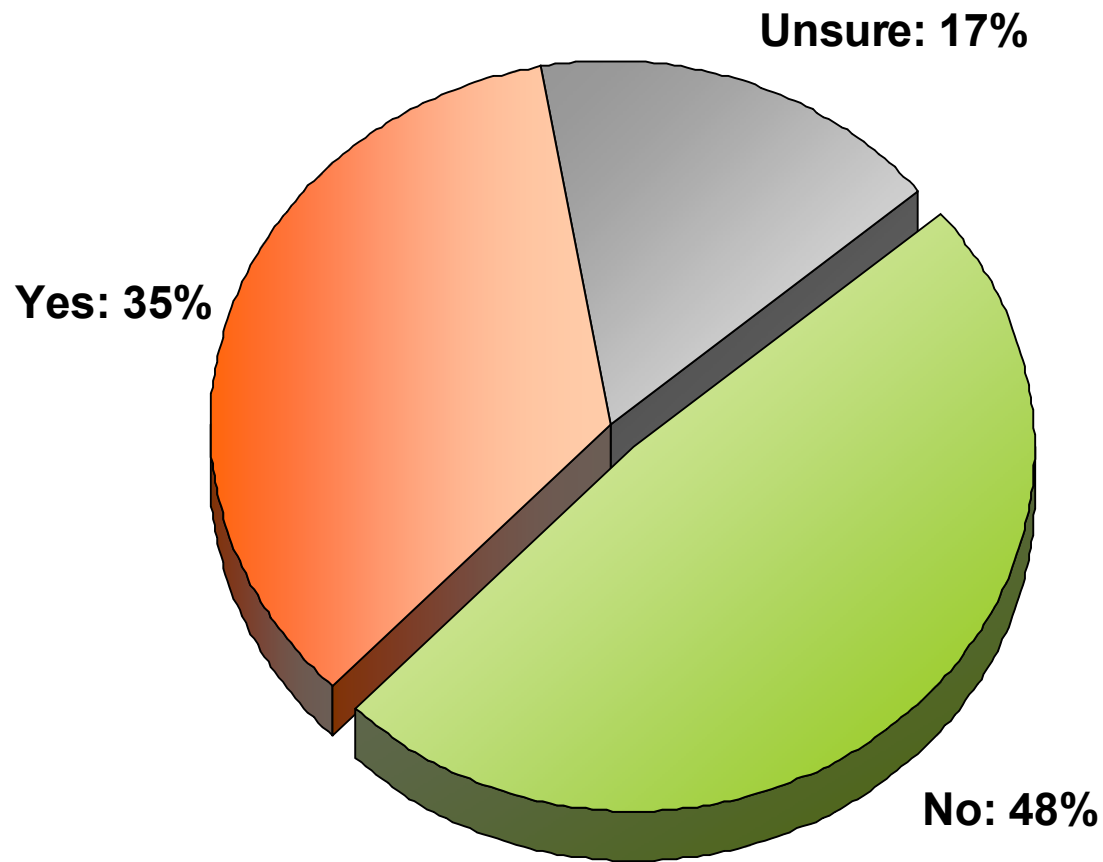
Higher awareness in Victoria

Have you heard of the recent attacks on Indian students in Australia?



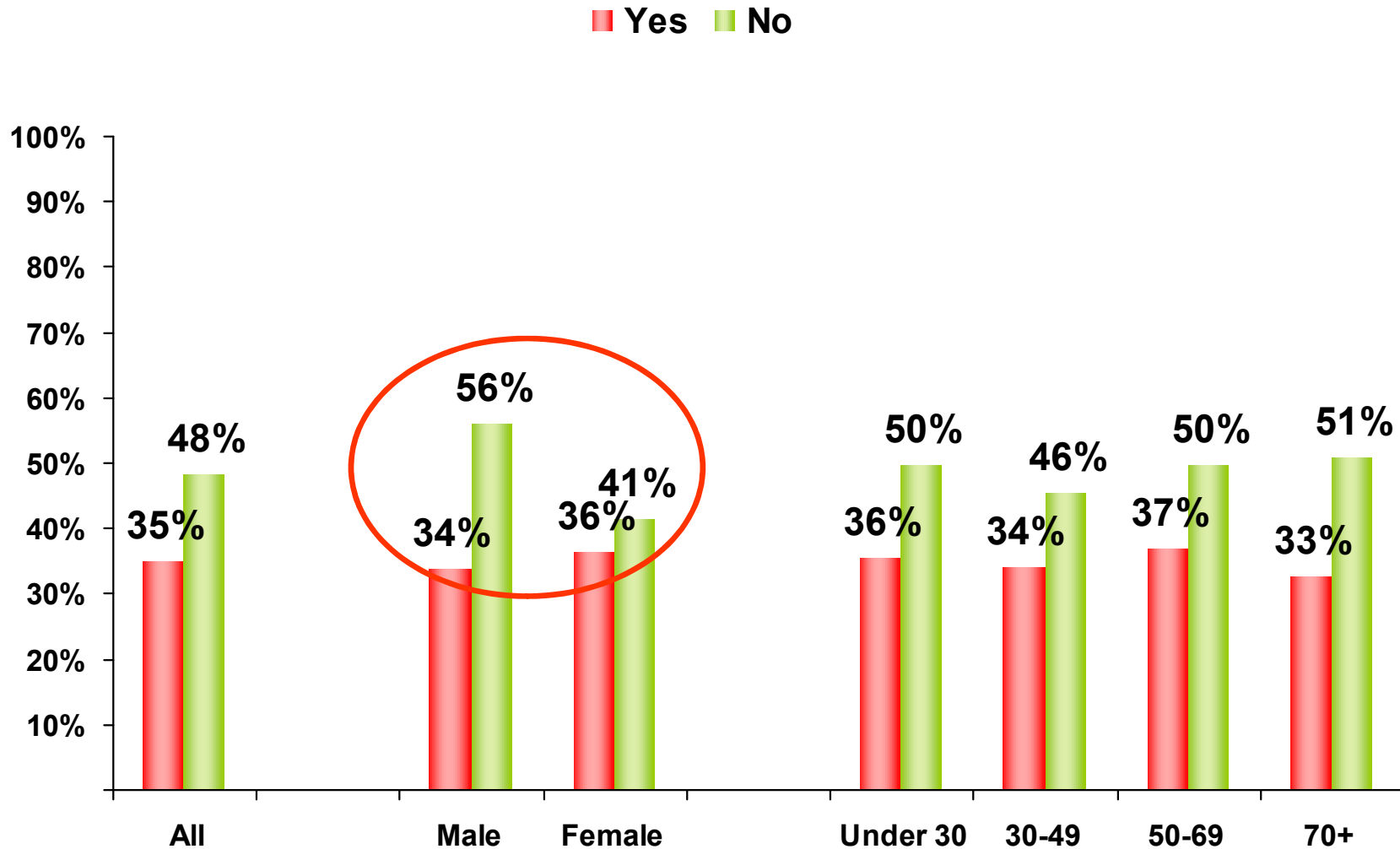
Only 1 in 3 think Indian students are attacked because of their race
